4. Reasons for the intended SRB The Faroese economy is a small, open economy with a concentrated business structure dependent on fisheries and aquaculture. We therefore advise reci- procation of the SRB by these member states in order to ensure level playing field and effectiveness of the measure.
5.3 Reciprocation by other Member States (Article 134(4) of the CRD and Re- commendation ESRB/2015/2)	Danish authorities advise the Nordic countries to reciprocate the systemic risk buffer rate of 1 per cent for all Faroese exposures. For reasons of proportionality a de minimis exposure threshold of 200 mn DKK is advised.

6.1 Combination with G-SII and/or O-SII buffers (Article 133(4) and (5) of the CRD)	An O-SII buffer is not applied on the Faroes institutions. However, an institution specific systemic risk buffer applies to the three largest credit institutions on the Faroes Islands. These large institutions are also designated as O-SII. The general SRB of 1 pct. for exposures in the Faroe Islands will be applied cumulatively with the institution specific systemic risk buffer.
